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Senator Chambers' sake, I would go on to say that I agree with Senator Schimek's amendment and I would accept that, and I'd like to know if there's 25 votes in here to get that done. Senator Chambers may have the rest of my time.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Senator Chambers.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Thank you, Senator Aguilar. I would like to ask Senator Beutler a question because, as he is wont to do, w-o-n-t, that's one of those little biblical words too, at some times the spirit just comes down on me and I don't know whether it's the Holy Spirit or that evil spirit from God that he put on Saul. Senator Beutler, you intermeshed yourself with this bill. You have an amendment pending. Senator Schimek has an amendment below yours and mine which would strike, from the green copy, this exception related to the employees. Then her idea is to deal with these other two individually. The one that relates to "secured with a restraint system" does not bother me because, based on the language here, you couldn't just tie a piece of rope around a child and that suffice. We could argue then about what we could do about the parades and the caravans. So here's what I'm going to ask you. To bring you up to where we are, Senator Schimek's amendment would strike lines 4 through 7, which talks about the employee. I will not agree to pull my amendments if yours remains there, because yours would still have an exception, I believe. So let me ask you that question.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Senator Beutler.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Would your amendment contain the same exception?

SENATOR CUDABACK: Senator Beutler.

SENATOR BEUTLER: Senator, let me begin by saying that I've been reading an Attorney General's Opinion and I haven't been following debate, so I'm not altogether sure if I'm tracking with you. But my amendment does have the exception for employees, including agricultural workers, dah, dah, dah, dah, dah, dah, same language that Senator Aguilar had, and my only intent in getting involved with the bill was to mesh Senator Aguilar's
