SENATOR CUDABACK: Senator Chambers.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Senator Schimek, you mentioned the word "complicated"; that it was beginning to be complicated. If it's beyond the person's ability to comprehend the current system, should that person be allowed to file for whatever office is involved? Or we really don't care about that, huh?

SENATOR SCHIMEK: Well, if we were setting the standards probably not, Senator Chambers, but that's not, you know, that's not up for discussion right now.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: So I don't have to consider that when I cast my vote in favor of Senator Stuthman's bill...

SENATOR SCHIMEK: Right.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: ...amendment?

SENATOR SCHIMEK: That's right.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Thank you. Now I'd like to ask Senator Stuthman a quest...

SENATOR SCHIMEK: Oh, I think this is my time.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Oh! (Laughter)

SENATOR CUDABACK: It is, Senator.

SENATOR SCHIMEK: Thank you, Senator. Anyway, I think that I should also note that if you're running for city or village office, you would still file with the county...I mean with the city clerk, if you're filing for city or village office. Now, you know, it's not real obvious to everybody but we actually in some counties have two different election systems. We have one at the municipal level and we have one at the county level. And very few cities use that anymore. And, in fact, we've got a bill that just came out of Government Committee to do away with that system so that everything is handled by the election commissioner or the county clerk.
