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this, one, without their parents' permission, without their parents' knowledge, and then coming home and finding some parents that are very upset. Whether they should be or not, I'll...I'll let that up to the parents. But any time that you're doing something where...to the body through an invasion, either in coloring or through penetration with a needle, there is an opportunity for, certainly, infection and whatever that...

SPEAKER BROMM: Time.

SENATOR JENSEN: ...might lead to.

SPEAKER BROMM: Thank you, Senator Bourne and Senator Jensen. Senator Chambers.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Thank you. Mr. Speaker, members of the Legislature, I'm not going to contest the representation that this overall amendment is technical in nature. However, in making changes that may seem to be technical, there are substantive issues hidden within them that even the offeror of the amendment may not have picked up. So I'd like to ask Senator Jensen a question or two.

SPEAKER BROMM: Senator Jensen, would you yield, please?

SENATOR JENSEN: Yes, I will.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Senator Jensen, the part of the division that we're dealing with is found on page 16, in lines 11 through 17. Do you agree that's where we are now?

SENATOR JENSEN: On this section? Yes.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Yes. All right. And I know on the gadget the amendment is set out with different numbers beside each line, but it refers us to page 16, starting in line 13, which is where I want to engage you in discussion.

SENATOR JENSEN: Yes.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Okay. And you're with me now?
