conflict or national emergency." And the place in your green copy where this would come into play would be on page 6, where it...or actually page 6, line 11. And it says, "Military service-connected disability compensation payable under 38 U.S.C. chapter 11, and compensation related to military service in an international conflict or national emergency." And then we would...then there would be Senator Louden's language about the Social Security benefits, and then it would go on to say "shall not be deemed to be disqualifying or deductible from the benefit amount." So the implication is it would be the same for those military veterans who have served in an international conflict, a national emergency. Now I should you that after the discussion the other day on this amendment, that the Department of Labor contacted us and said that there is a similar amendment, which was actually a bill, and it was LB 953, and that was amended into, as I understand it, Senator Vrtiska--and maybe you can confirm this--was amended into LB 951. And if I could just ask Senator Vrtiska a question?

SENATOR CUDABACK: Senator Schimek, this is a briefing. If you want to count...
