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I remember the heydays, when the State Fair was full every day. You know, and we had great entertainers who would come to the State Fair. And one of the funding sources for many, many years were the horse races at the Lincoln State Fair Park, and it ran for a...quite a lengthy season, and people that...the people that came and bet their money there on the horses enjoyed that. But there is another instance that has come to pass throughout time. Then the monies that we have used from the lottery proceeds, we've changed statutorily the Compulsive Gambling Fund, we've raised that from time to time, and some of you can remember when we used some of those funds to close the landfills throughout the state. And horse racing has been something that has gone sour. It's went south. When the people passed this provision several years ago, the constitutional amendment to allow us to establish the lottery, if I remember right, it won by quite a margin. But that's about the only form of gaming that we have in this state, besides the horse racing, which is, as I said, it's going south, it's not very good anymore. And I look at Ak-Sar-Ben in its heyday. We had the chance to save that particular racetrack about 12 years ago. And I think I've mentioned this on the floor before. I remember Senat. Hall fighting that battle; came in one morning and put up a kill motion on his own bill, and it passed. That was the end of that. And I don't...if that would have...if he would have stuck to his guns there and got that on the ballot 10-12 years ago, I don't believe we'd be having that argument...or this argument today. I'm interested in hearing everyone's opinion on Senator Landis' constitutional amendment. We did move it out of committee with some committee amendments. And until I can be persuaded otherwise, I'm going to support Senator Landis' amendment to let the people of this state decide whether...

SENATOR VRTISKA: One minute.

SENATOR JANSSEN: ...they want this. But if the feeling amongst everyone who is arguing here today is that they don't want it, it looks to me like it would probably go down quite heavily. But we don't know that. We don't know that. And the only way we can find out what the feelings of the people are, if they truly want to save the State Fair--or help to save it; I don't think that's going to do it entirely. I believe we need
