people who are not smelling and exuding those exhalations because they are very vigorous at a concert. What kind of concert are they going to have at a State Fair that's going to draw all these old fogies and young people to? (Speaking as Lawrence Welk) Wonderful, wonderful, play the polka. And you're going to have young people out there (singing). And that's going to draw these young people? And if you have the kind of entertainment they want, your ears will be as red as your face is now, because they will burn you alive. They will singe you. You will say, where did they get so vulgar? Why do they use such explicit obscene language? So you won't come to the kind of entertainment they would come to, and they're not going to come to what you're talking about. This is not about entertainment. My rural colleagues can be so easily fooled that they think it's going to be the resurrection of an old way of life that never in fact existed, but it exists in their mind now, because as they think back on it nostalgically, all of the negatives they drop out. All of the things they wish had happened will be there, and they get a false image in their head that they hold onto as the reality. Psychologists have said if a person perceives something as real, it is real to that person in its consequences. So these rural people are walking around in an unreal dream fantasy world. But the smart people, the ones tricking you into voting to contaminate the constitution and help Lincoln, don't have any misperceptions. They know what they're doing. They know that you are creating at least the possibility for some economic benefit to their city. That's what they're looking at. And if it doesn't cost them anything, why shouldn't they? This that the Legislature is undertaking is not good. This amendment that I'm offering, for the record, would strike and show as stricken, subsections (2) and (3) of Section 1 of LR 209CA. That would get rid of everything about the state lottery. It would leave in place horse racing, because that was here before the lottery. Then, on page 3, in line 11, you would strike beginning with the word "require" through "gambling" in line 15, and insert "eliminate the state lottery." And this would become a proposal placed on the ballot to let the public vote to eliminate the state lottery. This brings us right face to face with the issue. Now, because I'm offering the amendment, there may not be much discussion. There may not be a vote to adopt it. But an opportunity is being
