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change definitions too much...and I'm not saying that has been done yet, I'm still trying to understand...if too much is done in that area, if there is too great a relaxation, then some producers, I think, will process animal remains and incorporate it as protein in the feed administered to livestock. I am very concerned about BSE. No matter how much I hear from the U.S. Department of Agriculture, from the Nebraska Department of Agriculture, from producers and others who have a vested interest in keeping the public from being aware, first of all, of the nature of the disease, how it is transmitted, and how little there is being done in this country to protect the public against the existence of BSE, the contracting of BSE by the critters, and the putting of those infected critters as meat into the food chain of human beings, or the food supply. So I'm looking at this bill maybe with a more jaundiced eye than some of my colleagues will do, but until I'm thoroughly satisfied that I understand it, I'm not going to be in a position to support it.

SENATOR CUDABACK: One minute.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: This doesn't mean that I'm going to fight it. We were handed out this morning several sheets that attempt to explain to those of us who are slow of wit, slow of mind and lacking in understanding, how LB 916 is to function, I guess its interrelationship with Title 130, and how it affects existing law. But there is so much here that raises questions that I have not been helped by it yet. I did read through LB 916 and all I have so far are questions. Thank you, Mr. President.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Thank you, Senator Chambers. Senator Schrock, your light is next, and it's the only one on. You may either speak or you may...it's not on, so you may close on AM3030.

SENATOR SCHROCK: Yes, Mr. President, members of the Legislature, Senator Chambers, if I could have your attention,...

SENATOR CUDABACK: You are closing, aren't you, Senator Schrock?
