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painless, we'll take that \$14 million a year that was the camel under the tent type situation, \$14 million a year, there we go. Now we're back saying let's take gas tax, put it into a Judgment Fund by selling bonds. Put it into a Judgment Fund. We'll use the gas tax to repay the bonds. I understand that big change in policy there. Is that where we want to go? No. I...with Senator Beutler on a bill to increase the fuel tax, it's very difficult for me to say let's increase the fuel tax with these high fuel prices we see right now. But I'm willing to do that. Why--because we have needs and we're eroding our traditional income stream where...our base that we use to fund the Highway Trust Fund and we're diverting it to retire bonds that are being used to pay a judgment that we think will be \$151 million. I still believe, as Senator Tyson; I know several other people in this body, that we can come back, if it's a special session, so be it; we can come back in the fall, we can adjust this. I will vote for a tax increase of some sort when we see what it is, what our target is, we know what we have to do. I will come back, I'll make that commitment right now on the floor. I will vote for a tax increase of some kind, but I'm not willing to do it now, and I'm certainly not willing to be diverting funds from the Highway Trust Fund traditionally have been used for roads building, maintenance. We've already changed a bit of our policy with the sales tax on motor vehicles. Here we go. We started down the slope and it's picking up speed. We need to get this stopped at this stage. I do not support the Brashear amendment. I do support, if I had to vote for something right now, I'm a little bit like Senator Tyson, I guess the least lethal poison that's out there would be, in my case, the sales tax. If we need 33 votes, then let's start gathering those up if we absolutely are forced to do something. But I don't subscribe to the idea yet that we have to do something. Those of us on the Revenue Committee, I know it was not unanimous, but we decided there was no majority, no consent just to do anything with that. After that discussion we had with the Attorney General and his staff, that was the consensus, I guess. There was no majority to do anything else...

SENATOR CUDABACK: One minute.

SENATOR BAKER: ...than remain the status quo. And I would
