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SENATOR CHAMBERS: Since I'm dealing with a military operation, I'm entitled to use any of those eight principles that would be found in the waging of a military campaign. And they should not be surprised by any of them, should they?

SENATOR JANSSEN: No, I don't believe they would probably be surprised at any battle technique that you would render, Senator Chambers.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Senator Janssen, I know that the reason this bill came at this time was because of what's happening in Iraq. I think I can talk about that situation and why it should not be exploited, for eight hours, very easily. In your opinion, do you think that would be something I'm able to do? Or that I'm bluffing?

SENATOR JANSSEN: No, Senator, I've been here 13 years and I've seen you operate, and nothing surprises me anymore.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: And the National Guard feel that they can muster enough forces to get 33 votes to move this bill over my opposition, by forcing cloture, and thereby perhaps throwing the rest of the session in turmoil? They're prepared to do that because they are selfish, narrow-minded, and they want their own interest and their own way. But if they play their cards wrong, if they overplay their hand, not only will they not get this, but they will poison the session. And that's possible. Now, they might can get cloture on Select File. But this bill will come up on Final Reading, and there are other bills that will come up. Do you think the National Guard is aware of those dynamics that come into play on the floor of the Legislature during a session?

SENATOR JANSSEN: I imagine they're aware of that.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Did you bring these things to their attention when you were discussing this amendment with them?

SENATOR JANSSEN: No, I didn't.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Do you think they're out there with sweaty
