SENATOR CHAMBERS: Why then would you leave me out of the people receiving your accolades on this amendment? I'm just curious. What have I done to offend you?

SENATOR SCHIMEK: (Laugh) Senator Chambers, I wasn't totally convinced by your arguments. It was really Senator Louden's and Senator Preister's arguments that convinced me. That doesn't mean that you didn't make good arguments. I just was...

SENATOR CHAMBERS: (Laugh) I surrender.

SENATOR SCHIMEK: All right.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: I should have left well enough alone. It reminds me of a joke that is told, that I should have applied to myself, as far as the lesson. A man was on the witness stand testifying, and he said...the lawyer was defending a person accused of having bitten somebody's ear off. So the defense lawyer was questioning the man who supposedly was a witness. He said, now, you testified that my client bit this man's ear off. And the man, the witness, said, yes. The lawyer said, did you see my client bite the man's ear off? And the witness said, no. The lawyer said, then how can you sit there under oath and say that my client bit this man's ear off and you were a witness? He said, well, I saw him spit it out. So I should have just left this situation alone, since Senator Schimek had agreed to the amendment. Senator Preister almost provoked me into an area that I don't want to discuss, about how if we didn't have so many wars, we wouldn't have so many people defined as veterans who need to be buried. I'm not going to go into it, I said. Senator Preister resisted the temptation, and I still am not going to go into it. My reasons are those that I stated earlier. Since we're going to officially, by statute, breach that first agreement saying no cemetery project could receive federal...I meant state funds, or apply for them, we ought to just remove the prohibition, and any...

SENATOR CHAMBERS: ...project which can show that it qualifies,
