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which involves banking? In billiards, it's a game. That cushion is known as a bank, and when you use that cue stick and strike the ball in such a way that it recoils from or bounces off that bank, that is known as banking. So when you have banks and banking, you have an operation that fits within the definition of "banking organization." We have the Chairperson of the Banking Committee here, and I would like to ask him a question.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Senator Mines, would you respond?

SENATOR MINES: Yes, Mr. President.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Senator Mines, if you were to just accept my presentation, then billiards parlor would fit within the banking organization.

SENATOR MINES: There is a degree of banking in billiard parlors.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Would you support this amendment?

SENATOR MINES: No, Senator, I would not.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Mr. President, if I can't get the banking...the Chair of the Banking Committee to support it, I don't think anybody else will, so I will withdraw that.
