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we wanted to comport with a change in the federal law?

SENATOR SCHROCK: I don't think we would have to change our law.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Well, we can't automatically let the federal government change our law; otherwise, that is an unconstitutional delegation of our legislative authority. So if this law is drafted, intending to incorporate automatically any changes that occur at the federal level, then this law is unconstitutional.

SENATOR SCHROCK: No, you're wrong there, Senator Chambers.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Well, tell...

SENATOR SCHROCK: The federal Clean Air Act does not change, but the regulations that the EPA comes down with may change.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: So then we're talking about the way this law itself exists at a certain point in time; is that true?

SENATOR SCHROCK: We're...as it pertains to the federal rules and regs, and if the rules and regs change, this would allow our laws to change.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: So you're saying the federal rules and regulations can change, and our law will automatically change to incorporate those changes?

SENATOR SCHROCK: No, you're wrong there. This is like the federal Clean Water Act, Senator Chambers.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: I'm asking you. How can you say I'm wrong when I'm asking you a question? You can give me the answer...

SENATOR SCHROCK: Okay, all right.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: ...to the question correctly. Here's what my question is.

SENATOR CUDABACK: One minute.
