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would be helpful, I think, if we did know what some of the past history was and maybe we've done it, and maybe I should say probably we've done it, since I've been here, but I just don't happen to have a particular recollection of that. This could be...this...actually, this bill then has implications that we can't predict very reliably, is that correct, I mean as far as the fiscal note is concerned, into the future?

SENATOR BOURNE: I'm sorry, Senator Schimek. I apologize.

SENATOR SCHIMEK: That's okay. We really can't predict what...how this would impact fiscally down the road if we did adopt this amendment, could we?

SENATOR BOURNE: That's correct, but I will tell you that there is no fiscal impact associated with the amendment today.

SENATOR SCHIMEK: Yes.

SENATOR BOURNE: What it does say is that if we determine, actuarially, that the state teachers' fund needs some state monies, that we will just do the same for our city of Omaha school teachers. That's it.

SENATOR SCHIMEK: And that would...that would probably come about under what kind of circumstances, Senator Bourne?

SENATOR BOURNE: Oh, I think if there was a downturn in the market or...well, that's about the only thing I can think of, and we've seen that in the past.

SENATOR SCHIMEK: In the fairly recent past actually. Did we at that time? I believe we did.

SENATOR BOURNE: I don't...I don't know if we contributed or not. I think what we did was we increased the teacher participation...

SENATOR SCHIMEK: Oh, that...yeah.

SENATOR BOURNE: ...and so there was an increased employer and
