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mother herself for anything that she's done to her child. There was also the question of the early pregnancy situations; how would you know if the assailant actually did damage to the child when it was so early in the pregnancy? And again, it gets to questions of prosecutorial discretion. But there are instances where, even at the very early stages of pregnancy, it is possible, it is possible to inflict that kind of damage, which of course you won't realize until months later. But you can do it. You can do it chemically. And Senator Chambers himself acknowledged this last year. You remember we had the meth bill on the floor last year. It was LB 117. March 19, 2005, this is a...I'll read from Senator Chambers'...one of his floor speeches on that bill. He says, crack is dangerous. Pregnant women who have used crack have given birth to children who have crack in their systems. They're called crack babies. And here's the key point: Other drugs can be transmitted from the mother to the child. He's right, other drugs can, and there are many drugs on the market, and I had a handout for you on General File...

SENATOR CUDABACK: One minute.

SENATOR FOLEY: ...that listed a handful of those drugs that can be enormously dangerous to that child if they're ingested by the mother. And they could be by a person who...of ill will, who spikes her food or her drink with one of these drugs. She wouldn't even know that she's taken it. And she could inflict enormous damage because of the ingesting of that chemical substance. So even at the very early stages of pregnancy, it is entirely possible to cause that kind of damage and injury to the child. I think I'll just leave it at there, Mr. President. Thank you.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Thank you, Senator Foley and Senator Schimek (sic). Senator Johnson, followed by Senator Foley.

SENATOR JOHNSON: Mr. President, members of the body, a day or two ago...and I don't know what made me delve into this part of it, but Senator Foley, if I could have your attention for a little bit, because I'm going to try and look at this from just a little different point. I mentioned last time that, you know, how could we tell what the offending cause was, and so on. Now,
