SENATOR CHAMBERS: How?

SENATOR REDFIELD: Senator,...

SENATOR REDFIELD: What we know is that it is not the zygote of a frog, it is not the zygote of an insect,...

SENATOR CHAMBERS: That's not what I'm talking about. I'm going by...I want to be clear on what you said. You said, microscopically, a zygote has a body? Is that what you said?

SENATOR REDFIELD: I said, microscopically, it is still human.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Do you believe it has a body, a fertilized egg? Do you believe it has a body?

SENATOR REDFIELD: I believe it is a fertilized cell, and...

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Does it have a body?

SENATOR REDFIELD: You probably would not consider that a total body.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Neither would you. Would you?

SENATOR REDFIELD: No, but I would believe it was fully human.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Would you be in favor of modifying this bill so that whatever it is we're talking about--I would say "fetus" or "embryo," you would say "unborn child"--would at least have to be visible to the naked eye? You wouldn't agree to modifying it to say that, would you?

SENATOR REDFIELD: Actually, I would, because the truth of the matter is that there wouldn't be a prosecution unless in fact you could verify that there was something there.
