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not that long, but if you read it, which I doubt that anybody on this floor other than myself has done, you will see that when language in the petition is mentioned, the term is not just "malfeasance, misfeasance, or nonfeasance"; the words "in office" are attached, because we're talking about a specific act, and the act would be malfeasance in office, misfeasance in office, nonfeasance in office. So my first amendment relates to inserting, on page 1, in line 17, after the word "malfeasance," "in office." Then, in line 22 on the same page, after the word "misfeasance," I would insert the words "in office." On page 2, in line 3, after "nonfeasance," I would insert the words "in office." That is what the amendment does. None of these amendments is mind-boggling. Some there may be questions about, and I'm prepared to answer them. But since the bill as altered by the amendment provided by the Government Committee deals with the issue of recall, not just recalling a particular person from a particular board, as Senator Mines' original bill would do, I read it much more carefully and critically. Every time, Mr. President, I make up my mind that I'm not going to be reading these bills because if I'm interested in taking time I can just offer amendments to say, strike this section, strike that section, and do other things, but then when I look at the seriousness of the issue, I consider the time that the Government Committee put into handling the matter, it is not one that I should just cast aside. I do not want Senator Schimek or anybody who worked with her on this bill to be wounded in his or her ego or pride. But I have an ego big enough to fill this room and spill out into the city of Lincoln and continue needing additional space, and I have pride. Because I am a part of this Legislature, I owe something to my pride. And my pride is what compels me to work these bills in the way that I do, even though nobody probably cares. That is why my approach is so much different from the approach of my colleagues. I do what I do not to get the approval or affirmation of anybody, other than when time comes to get a vote. But besides that and other than that, I do what I do because it's the right thing for me as a member of this Legislature. And I do take very seriously the job we have of making laws. As I get into some of my other amendments, I'm going to point out that they're designed to bring clarity in an area where I myself was puzzled as to the precise meaning of the language utilized. Senator Schimek or
