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SENATOR CUDABACK: Thank you, Senator Stuhr. On with discussion. Senator Landis, did you wish to be recognized? Senator,...

SENATOR LANDIS: Let me bring up to the front an amendment hand drafted by George Kilpatrick, that Senator Chambers and myself have signed. And I was looking for Senator Brown, but I don't see her, to offer her the chance to read the language as well. Let me bring it up to the desk.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Senator Chambers, you have spoken three times. I'm sorry, but you have spoken three times. Senator Bourne, you're recognized to speak if you wish.

SENATOR BOURNE: Thank you, Mr. President, members. Senator Chambers has asked me to yield him some time, so I'll do that.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Senator Chambers.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Thank you, Mr. President. Thank you, Senator Bourne. And not only have I bonded with Senator Stuhr, I bonded with Senator Bourne, because he read my thoughts and yielded me the time that I had not orally asked for, but through brain waves I did. Senator Landis, Senator Brown, and members of the Revenue Committee, have worked to contrive the amendment which is up there now. This truly is what could be called a compromise, because it's far less than what I was angling for, but it's more than what would have been available otherwise. So I'm going to accept, and Senator Brown has agreed to also, but she can speak for herself, what we can get through this amendment that does provide some relief. Then, when Senator Synowiecki's bill comes before us, we will try to recoup through that bill whatever else of the remaining amount that we cannot get at this point in this bill. And Senator Landis knows that this bill that we're talking about is not one that I like. And there will be an opportunity for me to express the problems that I may have with other parts of the bill. But it is not a set of circumstances where I would just dig my heels in and say, I will stop this bill or try to stop this bill or delay this bill or try to delay it, simply because I can.
