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good education, my kids have got a good education in both OPS and Westside. But that's where my concern is, is if we can't improve, or if we can't maintain--Nebraska really has a good, quality education--for the students, then I think we're just wasting the time. I am for excellence in education, I'm for doing anything that will improve that education, even if it requires more funding. And if we have a problem with a particular school district because of, yes,...

SENATOR CUDABACK: One minute.

SENATOR JENSEN: ...the challenges they have, I don't have a problem in also funding them to provide that, to improve their system, and I think the majority of the individuals in this body feel that way, too. But I hope we don't forget what we're here for. This is for education--it's not a social experiment. We need to do everything we can to provide a good education for our children. I've been in the construction and real estate industry for years, and I will say this: When people come to town, the first question they ask, if they're going to relocate to Omaha, what is the school system like? What is the best school system? And whether that school system is in Omaha or Elkhorn or Valley or Council Bluffs or Glenwood, Iowa, they will go there, because they're interested in quality education. If we have an education system, if we have a district that needs help, I'm all for helping them, but I'm not for moving kids all across the state to achieve diversity, because I don't think that we are in the social experiment agency. We are to provide education for our students. Thank you, Mr. President.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Thank you, Senator Jensen. Senator Smith, and this will be your third time, Senator Smith.

SENATOR SMITH: Thank you, Mr. President and members. Would Senator Bourne yield to some more questions?

SENATOR CUDABACK: Senator Bourne, would you yield to a question?

SENATOR BOURNE: Certainly.
