Summary of purpose and/or changes:

LB 93 makes it unlawful to smoke in a motor vehicle when accompanied by an occupant under sixteen.

The bill requires a fine of \$50 to \$100. If an individual voluntarily participates in state-sanctioned smoking cessation program, such fine shall be refunded upon successful completion of the course.

A violation shall be a primary offense, and an officer may stop the vehicle if he or she witnesses a violation. The citation will not become part of the individual's driving record.

A violation shall not constitute evidence of negligence, shall not limit the liability of an insurer, or diminish any recovery of damages arising out of the use of the vehicle.

For purposes of this section, smoking means the lighting or possession of any cigarette, cigar, pipe, or other smoking material.
