A BILL

- FOR AN ACT relating to fences; to amend section 34-102, Reissue 2
- Revised Statutes of Nebraska; to state intent; to change
- 3 provisions relating to division fences; and to repeal the
- original section.
- Be it enacted by the people of the State of Nebraska,

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1 Section 1. Section 34-102, Reissue Revised Statutes of

- 2 Nebraska, is amended to read:
- 3 34-102 (1) When there are two or more adjoining
- 4 landowners, each of them shall construct and maintain a just
- 5 proportion of the division fence between them, and there shall be a
- 6 rebuttable presumption that a just proportion for construction and
- 7 maintenance shall be equal shares. If except that if the adjoining
- 8 landowners each cause or allow the use of the division fence to
- 9 confine livestock upon their respective properties, each landowner
- 10 shall construct and maintain the division fence between them in
- 11 equal shares. This section shall not be construed to compel the
- 12 erection and maintenance of a division fence if neither of the
- 13 adjoining landowners desires such division fence.
- 14 (2) Unless the adjoining landowners have agreed
- 15 otherwise, such fence shall be a lawful fence, as defined in
- 16 section 34-115.
- 17 (3) The duty assigned to adjoining landowners by this
- 18 section applies (a) when either or both of the adjoining lands lie
- 19 within an area zoned for agricultural or horticultural purposes as
- 20 defined in section 77-1359 and either or both of the adjoining
- 21 lands are utilized as agricultural or horticultural land and (b) in
- 22 all other areas of the state when both of the adjoining lands are
- 23 utilized as agricultural or horticultural land.
- 24 (4) The Legislature finds that the encouragement and
- 25 compelled duty of adjoining landowners for the construction and

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1 maintenance of division fences to be beneficial to the public

- 2 interest and welfare. Such benefits are not confined to historical
- 3 and traditional societal benefits that accrue from the proper
- 4 constraint of livestock, including suppression of civil disputes
- 5 and public and private nuisances and protecting public safety.
- 6 Division fences promote the peace and security of society by the
- 7 demarcation of rural boundaries, physical separation of conflicting
- 8 land uses, enhancement of privacy, diminishment of frequency of
- 9 public burden imposed by incidences of trespass and adverse
- 10 possession, and the mitigation of impacts of conflicting land
- 11 use intrusion into those areas of the state devoted to and reserved
- 12 to agricultural and horticultural use.
- Sec. 2. Original section 34-102, Reissue Revised Statutes
- 14 of Nebraska, is repealed.
