- 9 be liens, as in other actions, upon real property and any personal
- 10 property registered with any county office and may be enforced or
- 11 collected by execution and the means authorized for collection of
- 12 money judgments;
- 13 (2)(a) (2) The judgment creditor may execute a partial
- 14 or total release of the judgment or a document subordinating the
- 15 lien of the judgment to any other lien, generally or on specific
- 16 real or personal property. (b) Release of a judgment for child
- 17 support or spousal support or subordination of a lien of a judgment
- 18 for child support or spousal support may, if all such payments
- 19 are current and not delinquent or in arrears, be released or
- 20 subordinated by a release or subordination document executed by the
- 21 judgment creditor, and such document shall be sufficient to remove
- 22 or subordinate the lien. A properly executed, notarized release or
- 23 subordination document explicitly reciting that all child support

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1 payments or spousal support payments are current is prima facie

- 2 evidence that such payments are in fact current. For purposes of
- 3 this section, any delinquency or arrearage of support payments
- 4 shall be determined as provided in subsection (2) of section
- 5 42-358.02;
- 6 (c) Release of a judgment for child support or spousal
 7 support or subordination of a lien of a judgment for child support
- 8 or spousal support shall be approved by the court which rendered
- 9 the judgment if all such payments are not current. The judgment
- 10 debtor may file a motion in the court which rendered the original
- 11 judgment for an order releasing or subordinating the lien as to
- 12 specific real or personal property. The court shall grant such
- 13 order upon a showing by the judgment debtor that sufficient real or
- 14 personal property or property interests will remain subject to the
- 15 lien or will maintain priority over other liens sufficient to cover
- 16 all support due and which may become due;
- 17 (3) Whenever If a judgment creditor refuses to execute
- 18 a release of the judgment or subordination of a lien as provided
- 19 in subdivision (2) of this section or the support payments are
- 20 not current, the person desiring such release or subordination may
