Dear Mr. O'Donnell:

In the 2001 Legislative Session, LB 692 was passed into law. An annual \$50 million endowment for health care programs was created from the principal and investment income of the tobacco settlement fund and the Medicaid intergovernmental transfer (IGT) fund. Currently this endowment has increased to \$61.9 million annually for DHHS. The purpose of this endowment was to create an ongoing funding mechanism for health care in Nebraska.

NRS 71-7606 (LB 692) requires the Department of Health and Human Services to provide an annual report to the Legislature and the Governor detailing the use of funds appropriated under the Nebraska Health Care Funding Act and the outcomes achieved from such use.

The following report fulfills that statutory mandate. We appreciate the opportunity to share with the Governor and the Legislature the important work done as a result of this law.

**************************************	The Lifespan Respite program continues focusing efforts to increase its utilization. The program currently has 325 individuals with special needs that are utilizing respite services (slight increase from 322 in 2018). In Fiscal Year 2019 (July 1st, 2018 and June 30, 2019), the Lifespan Respite Subsidy Program served 699 individuals, including cases opened, closed or denied. Out of the 699 individuals served, 64% of those applying for assistance were under 19 years of age. The data for Fiscal Year 2019 showed a slight increase from the number of individuals served in 2018, which was 644 individuals served. (Previous years' data for reference – number of individuals served: 647 in FY 2017, 943 in FY 2016, 750 in FY 2015).  The allocation from the legislation was not fully utilized as the number of participants in the program continued to be lower than previous years. Of the \$419,653.11 utilized, \$68,926.31 was for those requesting additional assistance through exceptional circumstances.
