Summary of purpose and/or changes:

LB903 amends section 68-1212 to establish a statutory referral pathway authorizing child welfare case managers to refer at-risk families with children two years of age or under to eligible home visitation services as provided in the Family Home Visitation Act. Upon such a referral, participating home visitation agencies may seek reimbursement for covered services under the federal Families First Prevention Services Act (FFPSA). The bill grants permissive referral authority and does not mandate referrals in every case, thereby preserving the professional judgment of case managers. Its purpose is to facilitate access to home visitation services and enable FFPSA reimbursement by addressing the current barrier that prevents agencies from billing absent a formal referral identifying an at-risk family.

Explanation of amendments:



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Health and Human Services Committee

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AM1869 expands existing referral authority by permitting a case manager, when appropriate, to refer families with a child age three or younger to early intervention services, in addition to home visitation services. The amendment also outright repeals section 68-2306 which provides that the Family Home Visitation Act does not apply to a program that provides a single home visit or infrequent visits.
