SENATOR KREMER: Senator Kahle, you're not saying that you can't go deeper. I think what Senator Beutler is concerned about...if he does go deeper then he's not protected.

SENATOR KAHLE: You lose your priority?

SENATOR KREMER: Not your priority, but then it probably wouldn't...your right to collect damages, that's right. I mean, I think you enhance the domestic well owner's right to go to court and collect damages, if he goes deeper, and by striking the word "deeper" and leaving it only modified, whatever, it may be a larger well, or...

SENATOR KAHLE: Well, isn't this defeating exactly what you're trying to do though?

SENATOR KREMER: No, I don't think so.

SENATOR KAHLE: Okay, thank you.

PRESIDENT: The Chair would like to introduce at this time some 35 Senior High Political Science students from York, Nebraska. Instructor Greg Adams. They're seated in the south balcony. They're from Senator Sieck's District. Would they stand and be recognized? Welcome to your Legislature. Is there any further discussion on the Beutler amendment to the Kremer amendment? The question then is the adoption of the Beutler amendment to the Kremer amendment. All those in favor vote aye, opposed nay. It will require 25 votes. Have you all voted? Record the vote.

CLERK: 28 ayes, 2 nays, Mr. President on the adoption of Senator Beutler's amendment.

CLERK: Senator, may I inquire, does that mean strike (b) and everything thereafter?
