keeping and he says with regards to our recordkeeping provisions that there are problems with it, and he says there is no provision for confidentiality and he talks about a case that is known as Planned Parenthood of Missouri v. Danforth or commonly called, I guess, the Danforth case, but he says, "There is no provision for confidentiality; and in the Planned Parenthood case the Court specifically said that the fact that the statute provided for confidentiality and for keeping the records only seven years were factors that assisted in persuading the Court that the provision was constitutional. The Nebraska statute has no such provision." Then he goes on to talk about some vagueness and lack of specificity in that section as far as the woman's name and so on. I think that sort of discussion of confidentiality is a sort of thing that Senators Hoagland, Johnson and DeCamp were trying to address with this amendment. Now when Senator Venditte says that we will not know how many abortions are performed in the State of Nebraska, that is not true. There was an annual of compilation that will be required in this form. What will be confidential but will be known to the people in the Department of Health is which doctors perform which abortions and Senator Venditte's amendment makes every, as I understand it, every individual form a public record. Now I may be wrong but in reading it every reporting form becomes a public record, and this contains a good deal of information on individuals that I think is valuable maybe in its compilation as far as a state wide picture and I can see no public value other than perhaps harassment in knowing about it in the individual cases. So based on what Judge Urbom has said with regards to confidentiality as far as recordkeeping and based on the requirements that are in the form right now, I think that if we do not provide for confidentiality of the physician, if we do not indicate that the forms themselves are not public record, although the compilation is, that we will jeopardize the constitutionality of this section. So I would oppose Senator Venditte's amendment.
