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would even drop their opposition. I don't know.

PRESIDENT: The Chair recognizes Senator Chambers.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Mr. Chairman, first of all, in view of that letter I handed out the other day I want you to know that this work is totally mine. Nobody helped me with this at all and my name is on it and I addressed it to the Governor and send it to him and I am going to crow here a little bit today because I get tired of having to go through this time after time. I have told you things when we come up with these bills and I think you ought to not do what Senator DeCamp is asking you because he is not making you amend the bill. I am making you do it. I am making you come to heel today after trying to reason with you a few days ago, so are you going to give it to me in that fashion? And if you get hot today you will feel just in a small measure what I feel of another emotion when I can stand up here and try to explain to you and reason with you and show you court decisions backing the position what you ought to do and reject it. I dare you to follow what Senator DeCamp said and reject what I say. He tells you it is technical. That means from the way he is trying to get it across to you that it is insignificant. Don't add these amendments. Here is what I said on March 8. "Yes, Mr. President, I want my pound of flesh. They are talking about the very things I tried to bring to the body's attention the other day. You hasten and rush through on these things. You don't read. You don't understand so I would advise you to be very careful and cautious this morning in adopting these amendments", the very one they are talking about amending now. That is what I said and then going on further. "I don't think you ought to bring the bill back because with the problems that will still exist, the substantial problems that you will not address yourselves to, will still produce a bill which is not worthy of passage by this Legislature, however, since you unthinkly, unknowingly and without understanding intend to run this bill through", you can go ahead and do it. "Let the bill go as it is. The Governor must veto it. The Governor must veto it. The Attorney General has stated that there is serious constitutional problems with this bill. Based on what Mr. Thone said when he vetoed Senator Reutzel's bill about not setting a bad precedent, it would be unheard of for a Governor to fly in the face of his legal counsel and sign a bill into law which he knows has strong constitutional problems. This bill is like a tennis match. It bounces on
