SENATOR CULLAN: But, Senator Lamb, my specific question is why, as far as school districts are concerned, should we make a distinction between Class 1 school districts, Class 2, Class 3? Why, as far as transportation is concerned, should a Class 3 board of education have this authority and a Class 6 board not? Could not this same situation arise with the different class of school board, different class of school district?

SENATOR LAMB: I am sure it could. It could arise.

SENATOR CULLAN: Then why are we making the distinction?

SENATOR LAMB: Because we are trying to help Senator Simon without disrupting the whole transportation situation in all the school districts in the state.

SENATOR CULLAN: Thank you very much, Senator Lamb. Mr. President and members of the Legislature, again I think the evidence here indicates that there really is not sufficient information presented to us as to why we should make these differences. I would urge you to reject this amendment and on Final Reading to reject the passage of this bill.

SPEAKER MARVEL: The Chair recognizes Senator Koch.

SENATOR KOCH: A question of Senator Cullan if he will yield.

SPEAKER MARVEL: Senator Cullan.

SENATOR KOCH: Senator Cullan, how many school board members does a Class 5 system have?

SENATOR CULLAN: I don't know, Senator Koch.

SENATOR KOCH: How many school board members does a Class 1 system have?

SENATOR CULLAN: I don't know, Senator Koch.

SENATOR KOCH: How many school boards are elected by sub-districts?

SENATOR CULLAN: I am not sure, Senator Koch.

SENATOR KOCH: How many school board members are nominated by district and elected at large?
