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forth any information of a specific kind if they have opposition to provisions in the bill.

SENATOR KREMER: Senator Chambers, the reason that I am standing on my feet today, in times past this Legislature has been guilty, and I use the word "guilty", of severely stripping a bill and bringing in new material that was not discussed at the hearing level and I am about to the place that I am going to refuse to go along with amendments of this nature, not that I am opposed to them, Senator Chambers, but until such time that I have felt that the public has had a chance for input at a hearing. This is my problem today. I think we have been guilty of that and I don't think we ought to do that, and it is for that reason, I am not denying that you have some very fine points in the amendments you propose but they are extensive and I am a little disturbed at what we are doing or have done, at least. I think we are perhaps not doing to the extent we use to in stripping a bill and bringing on new material.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: But, Senator Kremer, when we say that the amendments are extensive, I don't think we ought to judge the complexity or difficulty of the amendment and material by the number of pages or words it takes to express the idea. There are a number of concepts presented here but none of them are complicated and the only thing extensive is the number of pages but there is nothing in here difficult to understand and I don't think it will substantially change what the bill attempts to do. If it is sunset, then they shouldn't put in the proposition about allowing the reuse of coffins. So it is more than a sunset bill and that was put in by the committee. They have stripped away the prohibition against advertising. That is a substantial step and it is a forward step but that does not relate to sunset. So certain people are willing to change positions in their argument. Either it is a sunset bill or it is not.

SPEAKER MARVEL: One minute.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Oh, I won't take the rest of his time. I am sorry.

SENATOR KREMER: I will give you the rest of my one minute if you want, Senator Chambers, because I asked you the question and I hope you understand why that I am a little apprehensive of going along with the bill at this point.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Senator Kremer, most Senators on the floor when they use the term "public input", they are
