SENATOR LEWIS: Well, Mr. Chairman, these are some pretty good sized ones and I want to try to slip them by, but I'll try to do it quickly. This has to do with license plates for...why don't you read that, Pat? Basically, what it does is allow those that have call letters and radio stations, etc. to get prestige plates, as I understand the amendment. I move the amendment.

SPEAKER MARVEL: Is there any further...what page are they on?

CLERK: They're on Page 974, Mr. President, of the Journal.

SPEAKER MARVEL: The motion is the adoption of the Lewis amendments to LB 103 found on Page 974. All those in favor of the amendments vote aye, opposed vote no. We're voting on the Lewis amendments to LB 227. Have you all voted? Record.

CLERK: 27 ayes, 0 nays on the adoption of the Lewis amendments, Mr. President.

SPEAKER MARVEL: Now the motion is to advance 227, as amended. Senator Simon, your light's on. Do you wish to be recognized? Senator Wesely, do you wish to be recognized.

SENATOR WESELY: Oh, I just had a question for Senator Warner.

SPEAKER MARVEL: Senator Warner, do you yield?

SENATOR WESELY: Well, this won't be funny. I'm just going to ask about the refund provision. Now I'm asking the legal counsel for the Public Works Committee about that, and as I understand it it's not just for trucks, it's for all motor vehicles, that if they become disabled or broken down that there can be a refund proportionately to the amount of time that they were in operation, or not able to function.

SENATOR WARNER: It has to be for the minimum time that the...it would be for twenty-nine days.

SENATOR WESELY: But if a car would go out of service, you could still get a refund. I mean, it wouldn't just be for trucks, is what I'm asking.

SENATOR WARNER: If it was out of service for twenty-nine days or more.
