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the amendments that have now been adopted that Senator Cullan has proposed and the committee amendment as it has been amended. The understanding that they've given with this at least with the non-opposition, and in effect support, is that we do...we do try to utilize these funds which Senator Cullan said he is going to do in another amendment later, in the appropriations, utilize this money for alcohol rehabilitation, we use it wisely and carefully, and we don't, so to speak, abuse the industry by repeatedly coming back...we come back on a reasonable basis, whatever that is determined by this Legislature to be. You may remember it was just a couple years ago when an amendment I put on a bill set up this fund to provide alcohol rehabilitation, and as I say, the industry wants to cooperate, but they of course hope the Legislature will do it upon a reasonable basis in the future. So I urge you to adopt the amendments and then push the bill forward.

SENATOR MARVEL: Senator Murphy, do you wish to be recognized?

SENATOR MURPHY: Ladies and gentlemen, once again we are caught up in an issue of compassion...what are we going to do with the alcoholic? I have passed out information that I asked for when 204 came before this body, the last time we raised the liquor tax and provided that we were going to serve the alcoholic. And I want you to look at those sheets that have been prepared by your fiscal staff that repeatedly tell you we don't know what is happening to the money we are presently allocating to these people. We don't know how it is used. Take a look at the report that was submitted by the Department of Alcoholism we created last year, and you tell me what they did with that money, or you tell me if you can understand what that report says they did with that money. If this problem is as severe as we claim it is, then we had better proceed in our legislation in this regard, not simply to throw more money at it, but to identify the programs that are being created and used, to identify the people who are being worthwhile in their rehabilitation who are truly being served in a constructive manner. We have got, if you will look at those three pages, seven or eight different agencies of the state whom we are providing money for the treatment of alcoholism, and I'll bet you that every alcoholic who submits to treatment is probably being served by two or three agencies. We have made absolutely no sense of this program and our answer is the usual answer of government, throw more money at it. If you look at the Revenue Department's report of
