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list of people and you will find that, and I think Senator Murphy has done an excellent job of cataloguing them and you will find that a good portion of these dollars go to hire staff, go for equipment, go for buildings perhaps, I don't know what else, but the actual alcoholic really receives very little of the dollar that is so well intentionally appropriated. I just visited with Senator Cullan and I pointed out to him that at the bottom line it's the city and the county that usually picks up the tab to a certain and lesser extent perhaps the state. I would hope that if the bill moves, and I'm not sure that it will, but if it does move, I've asked Senator Cullan and he has indicated some interest in that, that there be a way developed to divert the funds directly to those subdivisions of government which have the ultimate responsibility. If the city police pick up an alcoholic, the city has some responsibility and some investment and some costs. If it's a county sheriff who does it, the county has some costs. There's no way that we can get around it, and I can't...I know I have received complaints from my local city people, and my local county officials relative to the fact that we have all of these programs, and all of them are well intentioned, but very few of them get the dollars to the point where they are needed, and it still remains for the local government to pick up the costs of treating the drunk, and that's what they call him. Now he doesn't...you change a drunk from an...a characteristic by calling him an alcoholic or a sick person, or anything else. We all have those problems in our communities, and they're there. We can raise the tax and we can start a new program, and we can hire new people and more psychologists and more professional people, but it's still the cop on the beat, and it's still the county sheriff, who is the first in line when it comes to the arrest, and it's still those individuals, the county attorneys out there who have to make those decisions, and finally when it comes right down to the bottom line, it's the county and the city who is faced with most of the cost, and I know that all these programs sound fine, but unless you put the money where it does some real good, we're just chasing our tail. We'd just as well quit it. I know that the county people have got to be very frustrated, as are the city people when they see tens of thousands, or hundreds of thousands of dollars appropriated...well intentioned programs, none of them available to those governments. All of them available to other people who are not under their jurisdiction. There are a number of other programs here, and we're going to have some that are to come out of our Committee, which tend to try to treat

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
