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two hundred thousand, and then in 1979-1980 that's going to go to two million dollars. Is that correct?

SENATOR CULLAN: Well actually it would be...this would be a \$400,000 increase this year because of the effective date of the act. We would only collect about \$400,000 for this coming fiscal year. But the following year I would hope that we...of course, it would depend on the action of the Appropriations Committee.

SENATOR KELLY: Well, your...what good does your A bill do then?

SENATOR CULLAN: Well, my A bill appropriates \$400,000, not 800. This will generate about \$800,000 a year, but because of the effective date of the act for this coming fiscal year, we would generate about \$400,000. So I intend to appropriate all of that for alcohol services.

SENATOR KELLY: Thank you very much, Senator Cullan. I share with my colleagues the information that I have available to me on this bill at this time. \$800,000 would be raised if it were in place all year. It's not. It's only in place for half a year. We are currently spending \$1,200,000 of alcohol tax money for rehabilitation. It means next year it would be \$1,600,000 that we'd be spending, and Senator Murphy, through his letter to us from Dale Johnson attempting to identify the monies that are used by the various agencies in alcohol rehabilitation, I can identify right at a million dollar's worth which includes the fed funds. I believe, when you cut that back to the general fund, it's going to be some place in the neighborhood of \$600,000, maybe less...maybe about \$500,000 we can identify...where it goes and what it does, and you're asking for that much more without any explanation of where is the 700,000 of the 1.2. It would appear, Senator Cullan, that the Public Health and Welfare Committee should give us a little better rundown of the use of these funds before we just throw more flypaper on the wall.

SENATOR CULLAN: Senator Kelly, we will provide you with some additional information, if that's what you desire, but I haven't yet got a chance to address, you know, the bill, but I would say the one important part of this is that intoxication has been decriminalized, and that means the drunks can no longer be taken to jail, and that means that there is going to be a great demand for detoxification centers across the state of Nebraska, and I think we can use every penny of the \$800,000. Now the alternative to
