that in such a case the method of selecting delegates should be determined by the rules of the political party.

SENATOR NEWELL: Senator Warner, those....

SENATOR WARNER: Is that in state conventions or by their executive board or a group of us get together and decide we ought to have those rules?

SENATOR NEWELL: Senator Warner, that would have to be done by the official party organizations at the national and state levels. Now...

SENATOR WARNER: Would that be your executive board or would it be the state convention? I ask these questions because I am not trying to give anybody difficulty, I think it is important, at least where it can be done, that citizens have a direct opportunity to select good delegates by vote.

SPEAKER MARVEL: You have got one minute.

SENATOR NEWELL: Well, Senator Warner, one of the problems we have here is that that's different in each party and that is a hard thing to say which, you know, how it would be done. It is by the official, whoever can say they officially speak for the party. If it is the Ku Klux Klan Party and they have an executive board, then that is the one that speaks for that party.

SENATOR WARNER: Would you see an objection to having something spelled in that prescribes who within the party determines that?

SENATOR NEWELL: How?

SENATOR WARNER: Or how?

SENATOR NEWELL: No, I am asking you how can you do that?

SENATOR WARNER: I haven't decided yet but I am asking if you see a problem with having those guidelines as to how those rule (interruption).

SENATOR NEWELL: No, as long as it says the official party can make these rules, then I have no problems with that.
