SPEAKER MARVEL: Senator Maresh.

SENATOR MARESH: Yes, Senator Sieck.

SENATOR SIECK: Does this...if a man abandons his car, or his cabin trailer, as you say here, will he then have to be paid back the tax that he paid originally on the trailer?

SENATOR MARESH: If the vehicle is abandoned did you say?

SENATOR SIECK: Yes, if it was abandoned...if he didn't sell it, just quit driving it.

SENATOR MARESH: The way I understand it, this would be allowed a tax refund on the remaining months.

SENATOR SIECK: It would allow a tax refund on the remaining months. Then even if he still owns it he would... they would have to give him...

SENATOR MARESH: No, I think it would have to be disposed of. I'm not sure, but I think it would have to be disposed of if the...

SENATOR SIECK: Alright, if it would have to be disposed of then the other person that owns it he wouldn't have to be paying taxes on it in the first place, would he? Would he not? Doesn't the present law say that you get your tax refunded if you dispose of the vehicle?

SENATOR MARESH: I believe that's right.

SENATOR SIECK: Well, then why do we need this amendment?

SENATOR MARESH: All this does it just makes it uniform for cabin trailers to be treated the same way that other motor vehicles are. That's all we're doing. This is not changing the law itself. This is, just adds cabin trailers to the present law.

SENATOR SIECK: To the present law as cars are at the present time?

SENATOR MARESH: Yes.
