PRESIDENT: The Chair recognizes Senator Stoney. The Chair recognizes Senator DeCamp.

SENATOR DeCAMP: Question.

PRESIDENT: The question has been called for. Do I see five hands? Now the question is going to be divided as the Chair has ruled. We will vote individually on the, what I understand to be seven parts of this amendment. #5 I think has been withdrawn. Senator Keyes, is that correct? The fifth one has been withdrawn so we are dealing with 1, 2, 3, 4, 6 and 7 individually so the motion to cease debate and take up will be on that basis. All those in favor of ceasing debate under those circumstances vote aye, opposed nay. This is on ceasing debate so that we can get to the vote. This is on ceasing debate at which time we will get to vote individually on each of the matters. I was just indicating as to how the voting was going to be taken. Record the vote.

CLERK: 25 ayes, 11 nays to cease debate, Mr. President.

PRESIDENT: Motion carried and debate ceases and now, Senator Keyes, will you close on the six items that will be up before them. We will vote on them individually.

SENATOR KEYES: Okay. First of all, I would like to withdraw the two amendments, amendment 1 and amendment 2, so I will ask for a vote on those two to withdraw those two amendments. I ask unanimous consent to withdraw those two amendments.

PRESIDENT: All right, which are the ones that you have withdrawn now?

SENATOR KEYES: Amendment 1 and amendment 2. They just state the purpose of the bill and if they are satisfied like it is it is all right with me.

PRESIDENT: All right, so amendments 1 and 2 you have withdrawn and amendment 5 you have all ready withdrawn so we are left with your amendment 3, 4, 6 and 7.

SENATOR KEYES: We will take up amendment 3 and that is it inserts language in the definition of what are combined receipts and that means that all funds, whether Senator Simon wants them or not. The reason I say that all funds that come in because the state can come in
