they are not included but that is the kind of an example our reciprocal agreements and where we are hurting most. We are a receiver state in terms of undergraduate education. No question about it but Nebraska is hamstrung by the fact that we have such a limited population. If we want students to become doctors of podiatry, if we want students to become veterinarians, if we want students to have a program in marine engineering, if we have students that want a program in any of those specialized things, they are not available in Nebraska. One of the biggest problems we have now in veterinary medicine and I think most of the proponents would agree to it and I don't want that to be a part of this issue, is half our problem in veterinary medicine is student demand. Where do they go? How do we arrange that? What is the circumstances? The Southern Compact which I am extremely impressed with, and that is not a bunch of flaming liberals as you can imagine from Georgia and Alabama and Florida and some of those states, but they have an arrangement where they can slot those positions, Senator Dworak. The problem we have had in veterinary medicine since I have been here, and I am concerned about that. I am concerned that we have adequate veterinary services in the rural areas of this state is the surety of the program. They know how many students will be able to go to Tulane. They know how many students will be able to go the Veterinary of Medicine at the University of Georgia. We have reasonable demand for those kind of services but the demand level is not high enough that we can justify nor afford in this state, to build each of those professional schools and in my judgement, shaded as it is, it makes sense to me that neighbors work together in terms of those problems and cross state boundaries to do so. I am not uncomfortable with Senator Ross Doylan of Kansas working with me. I am not uncomfortable with Senator Thane of North Dakota working for me.
