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and in those small towns they don't control it really. The police of the town does.

SENATOR NEWELL: Thank you, Senator George. If I could ask Senator Warner a moment. Senator Warner, Senator Warner, was there a request by the Highway Department to add, the Patrol, is that who you are adding it to, Senator Warner was there a request by the Patrol to add four additional drug enforcement officers?

SENATOR WARNER: The only request that the Patrol made was for one additional person which was in their criminalistics lab I believe is what it is called which is the individuals that does blood tests and a variety of research for crime.

SENATOR NEWELL: So they really never asked for four additional officers to police drug control, did they?

SENATOR WARNER: Their request does not indicate any, no sir.

SENATOR NEWELL: Okay, if I could ask you, maybe I should ask Senator George this question. Senator George, now those four people that you are going to move from the Liquor Control Commission to the State Patrol, would they then become patrol officers or are you just changing the money?

SENATOR GEORGE: No, the money would be changed from one department to the other. What they would do is they would increase the number of people that work in drug control area not as uniformed state patrolmen in patrol cars at all. No, that is not the point.

SENATOR NEWELL: But you are planning to move those four people...you are not planning to fire those four people from the Liquor Commission?

SENATOR GEORGE: No.

SENATOR NEWELL: You are just trying to transfer them over there.

SENATOR GEORGE: Yes, my information is is that that can be done.

SENATOR NEWELL: Okay, thank you, Senator. Now if I could speak just briefly to the George amendment, Senator George has expressed to me some problems with the Liquor Control Commission in the past and I do recognize that they have some problems. One of the problems is they do their jobs
