LB 143, 220

PRESIDENT: All provisions of law relative to procedure having been complied with, the question is, shall LB 143 pass? All those in favor vote aye, opposed nay. Have you all voted? Have you all voted? Record the vote.

CLERK: Record vote read. (See page 1524, Legislative Journal.) 25 ayes, 12 nays, 5 excused and not voting and 7 present and not voting, Mr. President.

PRESIDENT: LB 143 passes on Final Reading. Before we proceed with Final Reading, the Chair would like to introduce from Senator Simon's District forty-five fourth grade students from Holling Heights School at Millard, Debbie Johnson is the teacher. They are in the South balcony. Would they just kind of wave to us because I think some of them are just kind of hanging over the edges there. Good morning. Welcome to the Legislature. Pardon me. I was just going to say if everybody would stay at their seats it wouldn't take so long to call the votes on these things. The next bill on Final Reading, Mr. Clerk will read LB 220.

CLERK: Read LB 220 on Final Reading.

PRESIDENT: All provisions of law relative to procedure having been complied with, the question is, shall LB 220 pass? All those in favor vote aye, opposed nay. Record the vote.

CLERK: Record vote read. (See page 1524 and 1525, Legislative Journal.) 40 ayes, 0 nays, 5 excused and not voting and 4 present and not voting, Mr. President.

PRESIDENT: LB 220 passes on Final Reading. The Chair would like to take this opportunity to introduce from Senator Koch's District some 38 fourth grade students from Seymour and Maywood Schools in Ralston. Wilma Larson and Joan Breen are the teachers. They are up here in the South balcony. If they will kind of wave to us, they are right up here, and say good morning. Welcome to the Legislature. Also say to all of you who are visitors who are in the balconies from the schools, you are observing the Legislature, watching them on Final Reading, which as I told the group earlier is not the best time in the world to see the Legislature because all legislators are supposed to be at their desks according to their own rules. That is why occasionally you hear me asking them to return to their desks because the Constitution requires that every last word of every bill be read by the Clerk on Final Reading. About one fifth of the
