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have had a number of those things that we have considered and I am sure if everyone of us had a chance to sit down sensibly and have an open discussion, not a closed door discussion, where you could hear both sides in an argument and today it has been a well organized argument. Some of you talked two, sometimes three times, some of us never got a word to say. Yes, I think we have a problem and the only way to solve it seriously, maybe we have to start all over, the bill should not have been written by the Health Department. I admit that from the very start and I apologize but we thought we had some expert help there and tried to use it. I think we made a mistake, and if you read the bill you can see why and that is the green copy and now we are back to the green copy again but we have some real serious problems with that bill. I really hope all of you think very conscientiously not only from the pocketbook, yes, who pays the bill? The public. Yes, who is the public? Who pays the bill for your bread and butter? Who pays the bill for everything? It is the public. So, yes, let's consider the public but let's consider some reasonable efforts and when we do something like this it is going to stay with us, and if it is going to hurt our health care, I think we are making a big mistake. I would like to see reconsideration of what we have just went through. I really think if you would take the time, study the amendments and see what we have really done, you'll look at it seriously. I appreciate the extra time. Thank you.

SPEAKER MARVEL: Senator DeCamp and then Senator Koch.

SENATOR DeCAMP: Mr. President, members of the Legislature, just kind of like to think out loud with you all for a minute. I know particularly my first couple of years down here maybe an amendment would go on a bill or some would take a completely different direction than you were kind of thinking or planning and your first reaction, your first reaction is, well, by golly, I don't have to take that and then we'd throw a kill motion up on our own bill or our own idea and, well, when you have an hour, two hours, three hours to think about it, you kind of cool off and you think, well, we got to take care of this problem anyway and killing the bill isn't going to do her. So I think maybe we ought to think about the things we all agree on here. From what I understand we all agree, I think everybody in the room agrees that we are going to have to do something. Right? We all agree we have got high health care costs and for one reason or another we are going to have to probably pass some legislation in this area. Okay, now we are not in total agreement apparently with the version the bill has now taken,
