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I'd like to ask Senator DeCamp some questions.

SPEAKER MARVEL: Senator DeCamp.

SENATOR DeCAMP: Yes.

SENATOR FITZGERALD: On the portion pertaining to pickles, when we go and play bingo, would it be permissible to sell pickles in the bingo hall?

SENATOR DeCAMP: Okay, that's one of the things that Senator Johnson is going to be addressing in his amendments and how the proceeds and all this are developed. We want to make sure it's done right. He and Senator Bernice want to make sure that their pickles aren't abused. Senator Marsh has asked, what is a pickle, because we keep talking about pickles. With your permission, Senator Fitz, I'd explain what a pickle is and give everybody one if they want. Is that okay, Fitz?

SENATOR FITZGERALD: Yes, I got...but I would like the question answered before my time allotment is up.

SENATOR DeCAMP: These are free pickles today. Pass one... huh? Okay, there's no payoff on these pickles, by the way. But you keep hearing pickles and you hear about slot machines and lottery. Because of Nebraska's definition of a lottery, it's wide open. Attorney General's opinions and Supreme Court rulings have just opened this wide up, and that's one of the major things the bill corrects. Now, let me explain how a pickle works, not that I've ever bought one, or used one, or anything like that. Anyway...

SPEAKER MARVEL: Remember you're dealing on his time, so...

SENATOR DeCAMP: Well, he doesn't mind. Okay, you see on the back, you tear open the little tab and if you get three cherries, or three plums or three bells, you win money. The only difference between this and a slot machine is that on the slot machine you pull a handle and it does the same thing. Here, you just buy the card for a quarter or fifty cents and if you win, somebody physically hands you the money. So, the Attorney General in ruling these legal basically, and the Supreme Court, opened up the question, well does that mean slot machines are legal? The problem that they're encountering with these is that the wrong people are getting the money in many cases. They say the expenses of administering it are ninety-nine or a hundred percent of the thing. So, Senator Johnson and the Attorney
