PRESIDENT: All right, thank you Senator Newell. That clarifies that. All right, the question then is the adoption of the amendment to LB 495, the Haberman amendment. All those in favor vote aye, those opposed vote nay. Have you all voted? Senator Haberman.

SENATOR HABERMAN: Call the House.

PRESIDENT: All right, Senator has asked for a Call of the House. All those in favor vote aye, those opposed vote nay on a Call of the House. He is experiencing difficulty. The machine jammed so we will have to vote over on this one when he gets it cleared. All right now the question is shall the House go under call, Call of the House. CLERK: 20 ayes, 2 nays to go under Call, Mr. President.
