I really think that the biggest need that we have for veterinarians now is probably in the swine industry because that is the fastest growing livestock industry that we have in the state and it has been. Maybe they are going to overproduce. I don't know. But it just looks reasonable to me to think that the state that is #3 in livestock production and has spent billions of dollars on education in the state is not ready and willing to build something that is worthwhile for the main industry of the state, and Senator Koch mentioned that....

SPEAKER MARVEL: Your time is up.

SENATOR KAHLE: ...the livestock business, we won't have to worry about the graduates in business school if our livestock industry fails, thank you.

SPEAKER MARVEL: Senator Kremer.

Senator Kahle has already noted that three of us have spent a great deal of time working on the concept of a regional vet school in the State of Nebraska. We have made a number of trips especially to the State of Wyoming and we met with other state senators and other people that are involved in the proposal of the vet college and it took me some time before I was persuaded that I could support this proposed vet school but I have arrived at that for a number of reasons.
