We have one at Scottsbluff. There are other areas perhaps that we could consider where part of these programs may be conducted. I would hate to see us just to go in on a veterinary college. I think in order to vie, if that is the right word, to get students to come to our vet college in opposition to other vet colleges, we have to have something more glamorous, something better than other just veterinary colleges across the country, and if we support this, I think we should have open minds as to what we want to do in the future to make this a better vet college than just a vet college and I support the bill at this time but I do think we should look to the future a little bit more. We have in mind what it is going to cost but we should look carefully at what this vet college is going to be as compared to just a veterinary college.
