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the most burdensome tax, think how much more burdensome it is for the individual that is paying three and four times his share. That is the problem and, Senator Warner, the laws are on the books, there is a system if it would be followed. That is the only point I am trying to make here. The laws are not followed. The system is not followed. The property tax is the most burdensome tax, agreed. If public officials who are vested with the responsibility to carry out these laws will not follow them, then I think this Legislature has to begin stepping in officially and formally and doing absolutely whatever is necessary. Now I said the ones that cheat the most, that violate the laws the most benefit the most. Obviously, a county with a mill levy four or five times as high as it is supposed to be, because the valuation is low, is getting the most from the state when they are actually entitled to the least. The one that follows the law and have their mill levies accurate and has low mill levies, they get less money. So vote on the amendment. It follows the law and, obviously, it is going to be defeated.

SPEAKER MARVEL: Motion is on the DeCamp amendment to....Senator DeCamp has withdrawn his amendment. Are there other amendments on the desk?

CLERK: Yes, sir. Mr. President, Senator Koch now moves to amend.

SPEAKER MARVEL: Do you want to read the amendment?

CLERK: On page 3, line 13 strike \$42,198,000 and insert \$46,048,000. In line 16 strike \$70,698,000 and insert \$74,548,000. In lines 18, 20 and 25 strike \$55,000,000 and insert \$58,850,000.

SPEAKER MARVEL: Senator Koch.

SENATOR KOCH: Mr. Speaker, in deference to you and members of this body, I will not use this amendment as a harassment. It is obvious that the body has acted in good faith and so I ask unanimous consent to withdraw it.

SPEAKER MARVEL: Senator Koch has withdrawn his amendment. Is there another amendment? Do you have another amendment?

CLERK: Yes, sir. Senator Brennan now moves to amend, Mr. President. Read Brennan amendment found on pages 1864 and 1865, Legislative Journal.
