PRESIDENT: Chair recognizes Senator Cullan.

SENATOR CULLAN: I call the question.

PRESIDENT: All right, the question has been called for. Do I see five hands? I do. All those in favor of ceasing debate vote aye, opposed vote nay. The question is to cease debate on the Goodrich amendment. Record the vote.

CLERK: 28 ayes, no nays, Mr. President, to cease debate.

PRESIDENT: Motion carried. Debate ceases. Senator Goodrich, would you close on your motion to return?

SENATOR GOODRICH: Yes. First of all the delay, well never mind, heck with it. John DeCamp, Senator DeCamp would you yield to a question please?

PRESIDENT: Senator DeCamp will you respond?

SENATOR DE CAMP: Affirmative.

SENATOR GOODRICH: Just keep that mood. Now, if I withdraw this, which I am about ready to do, would you then put your own motion up there to pull it back to put the July 1st date on there as opposed to the date that you have got in there?

SENATOR DE CAMP: I absolutely will. I said I would. I think that is reasonable because it keeps the leverage there, and if the railroads are sincere, what they said in that letter that is a matter of the official record of this legislature, that they are going to figure a way to make this payment equivalent money.....

SENATOR GOODRICH: Okay, that is enough John. Okay, lets amend my amendment to strike what I have in my amendment then, if we could amend it by striking my amendment and putting in the new date, oh wait a minute we have to bring it back for a specific amendment. Never mind. I'll withdraw....

PRESIDENT: He will have to bring in his own amendment.

SENATOR GOODRICH: I'll just withdraw my amendment.

PRESIDENT: You want to just withdraw yours? Okay, motion is withdrawn. Now.
