SENATOR VICKERS: Mr. President and members of the body, the reason I put this amendment on here is because of some developments that I have become aware of the last couple of weeks. As a member of the Education Committee we heard this bill in the public hearing, and it was indicated to us that the need for this bill was great because of the fact that the surrounding states were, in fact, going to implement a policy whereby they would not accept any out of state students, and in my mind that's a crucial question. Are we, in fact, going to be in a position where no Nebraska student can be educated with a degree in veterinary medicine? It seems to me that if we can get the students educated, if we can have something to say about their education, the curriculum, the admissions, that's the goal of this whole thrust of LB 357. Now there's many people that will tell you how much money it's going to bring into this state. There's many people that will tell you how many more students are going to get in college because of it, but I'll submit to you there's going to be Nebraska students that still aren't going to be able to get in college even if we have
