PRESIDENT: Senator Lamb.

SENATOR LAMB: He gets....Senator Kahle says he gets motion sickness. I wondered if you had a remedy for that.

SPEAKER MARVEL: I have found no pills that will take care of either sickness or the disease known as politics.

PRESIDENT: And that should take care of that. The Chair recognizes Senator Chambers.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Mr. Chairman and members of the Legislature, I'd like to ask Senator Marvel a question relative to study resolutions.

SPEAKER MARVEL: In the first...in the first place, Senator Chambers, I'm on the Executive Board but I do not know what the actual schedule is, but I will say this, I think the Executive Board announced last week, and maybe somebody else on the Board can help me with this...announced last week that the 15th I believe was the deadline for resolutions that have to do with interim studies. The only other thing I could suggest that you could do....do we meet at 1:00 o'clock or at noon, or what? I think at that time if you have a resolution, the only way you could process it is by amending it into an existing resolution. That's the only suggestion I have.

PRESIDENT: The Chair recognizes Senator Nichol.

SENATOR NICHOL: Mr. Chairman....Senator Marvel, may I ask you a couple of questions if I understood you correctly. Did you say that unless something was printed now it could not be incorporated into a bill?

SPEAKER MARVEL: Yes, because the printer is broken down. It's impossible to get according to Emory, and he's supposed to bring these motions up within the next few moments. But the printer is broken down and if your amendments are not printed or printable...if they're not printed, you in effect are out of luck.
