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over the five sessions I have been here, we have been busy every time we start in a session and if we have a vacation of one week, then we are not here to do the business that we are talking about. Now as far as hearings outstate or greater state, whatever you want to talk about, we have had hearings outstate. The people who are interested are knowledgeable and they are knowledgeable about when these hearings take place. The news media in our area which is about as far as you can get from Lincoln, Nebraska, and still be in the state does a good job of letting people know when hearings are. I don't think we ought to come down and start the session by taking a two-week vacation. I am very much opposed to even one week, Senator DeCamp. I think we should come down, go to work and stay at work.

PRESIDENT: Senator Clark.

SENATOR CLARK: Mr. President and members, I am certainly going to have to agree with Senator Nichol and I live about as far as he does. To me all it does and when you take one week or two weeks more and it doesn't really make any difference whether it is one or two, it just extends the session for one week or two weeks, whichever you are going to use. I think it is probably all right for someone that lives in Lincoln or Omaha or someone who can go home. I live three hundred and fifty miles from here which means I am going to have to stay down one extra week. I just can't see where we are going to have the additional help that we have to have. We can't lay the help off for one week or two weeks. They are going to have to be continued on. It is going to be an additional cost to the Legislature. There is no other way out of it. I just cannot see why we would want to extend the session. Now since 1934 it has been going the way it has been going and it has been working pretty well. People know what the bills are up and if a senator, especially from my district or Senator Nichol's district or Cullan's, any of those far districts out there, certainly we let the people know the bills that are going to be heard early, that is going to affect our district. That is our job to do that and I do not believe that we should ever go for one week or two weeks and extend our session. I don't think the people of Nebraska want that. They said ninety days and sixty days, and sometimes that is way too long. So personally, I am against extending the session under any condition. Thank you.

PRESIDENT: The Chair recognizes Senator Dworak.
