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inspected.

SENATOR MERZ: Some place on the line.

SENATOR SIMON: I think it might even be over here but I don't know.

SENATOR MERZ: At one time when I used to butcher, these snouts and things you are talking about to me was one of the best meats we had. I mean we used to make some good old head cheese out of them that was far superior to anything. We called this the delicacy of the meat. Now they call that something else. At one time if you remember the old butchers, they used that, every bit of that, everything but the squeal. But this I think is a point that I never received any letters and I don't think Senator Schmit has either in regard to any sausage maker objecting to this. They never showed up at the hearing. But in regard...Senator George.

SPEAKER MARVEL: Senator George, do you yield to a question?

SENATOR GEORGE: Certainly, yes.

SENATOR MERZ: You think this is going to hurt our exports of meat then?

SENATOR GEORGE: I believe it most certainly will. I made one condition, Senator Merz. If you want a stringent inspection law that any foreign meats coming into Nebraska will meet our inspection quality standards, I am all for that bill, but do you know that we have about five USDA inspectors in the port of Rotterdam, Holland, alone to inspect every piece of meat that leaves the European market and comes to here? If you don't like their quality of inspection and you want a more stringent inspection for Nebraska, fine, I will support you, but otherwise you are going to hurt the export of Nebraska beef, for instance, of Nebraska offals that goes into millions of dollars because if they want to do the same, come there to the back door, you are going to get hurt.

SENATOR MERZ: We aren't condemning their meat if it is properly inspected.

SPEAKER MARVEL: You have one minute, Senator Merz.

SENATOR MERZ: We are allowing it to be put on the market. We are just telling the people which is American and which
