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you are not dealing with a few disorganized frightened students carrying a picket sign because it is faddish, or that you are unleashing a horde of armed policemen on unarmed black and poor people who do not have the means to resist. You are dealing with a war-like nation which is anxious for a confrontation, which is willing to make a war and fight the war. In this country you have people willing to make it but not fight it who will condemn young men for running to Canada in order not to fight a war they don't understand for a country pushing things they don't believe in. You don't see old men saying, bring back the draft and draft us first because we are experienced, we've made our blunders, we've lived our lives, and if there is a war now to fight for this country. Those who have benefited from it ought to bear the brunt of the fight. No, you have fat, old bald-headed men sitting back saying, your son dies. These other poor and black people will be the cannon fodder, and let them die out of all proportion to their numbers or the good they realize from this country. I am going to say like Nassar said, Russia wants war, we welcome war. If Russia throws down the gauntlet let us follow people like Goldwater and Ronald Reagan, and funnel weapons through Pakistan into Afghanistan.

PRESIDENT: One minute.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Let us stand nose to nose and eye to eye with the Russian bear and not blink, but let us not play and pretend in situations like this that we are dealing with something when we are skirting the issue. We are talking in this resolution about money. Russia may be talking about world conquest. If you are going to get into a game, understand the rules and understand the stakes. It is not just agriculture in Nebraska. It may be dominance of the world. I am going to have to speak again, Mr. Chairman, because I ran out of time and I am not going to ask like Senator DeCamp did because it would take me longer than the small amount of time you could give me.

PRESIDENT: All right, thank you, Senator Chambers. The Chair recognizes Senator Johnson.

SENATOR JOHNSON: Mr. Speaker, I would yield my time to Senator Chambers if he wished to continue.

PRESIDENT: All right, Senator Chambers, you may continue on Senator Johnson's time.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Since Senator Johnson has given me the time
